SEEDS, NEEDS AND DREAMS:

Some findings from our Parish Away Day

At St Leonard's Parish Away Day in May, a group of about 30 people gathered at St Mary's Church, Stoke by Nayland. We split into groups and began to share stories of our experience of St Leonard's: recalling times when we have felt blessed, involved and encouraged, and thinking about our church's core values. We learned that what really matters to the life of St Leonard's ranges from love, inclusivity, and bringing people together in worship, to joyousness, fun, worship, friendship and fellowship. There was a sense that at the centre of St Leonard's life is a desire to share, welcome and worship with all, and to build relationships and communities.



We then thought about obstacles faced by those who aren't used to church. Many groups highlighted the importance of meeting people where they are: going out into our community and building personal links. The importance of personal invitation and of work with schools and other community groups and organisations was also noted.

It was observed that many people fear being judged when coming to church for the first time; that some expect us to be a ‘closed group’ or a members-only club, and that the very first step into church can be a very scary one indeed!



Our second session was on the theme of “seeds and needs” and grew from a reflection on the Parable of the Sower. Matt encouraged the groups to think of St Leonard’s as a smallholding or a farm, where we all participate in God’s work. What are the green shoots in St Leonard’s? What is God bringing to growth? Where is there decay – that natural and necessary process in every garden? What might we need to let go of as a church? What do we need to prepare the ground for mission and ministry in Lexden? What are our communities’ needs? Interestingly, what some groups identified as signs of growth, other groups saw as signs of decay. Signs of growth were seen in very many of our regular activities, but Messy Church, our youth and schools work, and our Friendship Lunches’ potential to further reach the isolated in Lexden were most commented upon.

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When considering areas of decay, some of the groups noted that for many the old model of weekly commitment is difficult due to the changing shape of peoples' lives, and that it is increasingly challenging to recruit people to some of the higher-commitment activities in church (some of the things for which we have rotas, for example).

In considering the needs of our community, our groups thought about Lexden, West Colchester and the region in general. Some of the most pressing needs included support for young people with mental health issues, difficulties in relationships and family situations, the needs of the new housing estates in Stanway and beyond, the need draw the two "halves" of Lexden parish community together, activities and facilities to engage young people and children, and the issue of isolation for those who are housebound.

Finally, in a third session, imaginations were set loose as the groups wrote newspaper articles for May 2029 – explaining the Good News of what God is doing in St Leonard's. Matt encouraged everyone to dream, and to consider what would be needed for those dreams to become reality. The OMG+ youth group came up with some wonderful stories about welcome parties, and using technology both to welcome newcomers, and also to help those who are isolated connect with the

church through broadcasting services. Some of the other good news stories included: a St Leonard's nature reserve; a rehabilitation centre; a community choir; banqueting hall to accommodate massive friendship lunches; a number one hit for the church rock band; a music festival with music tuition; a re-ordered nave to make the space more flexible; a church full of various forms of dance, drama and music; a youth drop-in centre in the Collingwood Road area, and a "Phoenix Fun Park" soft play/study/coffee centre on the site of the burned-down church hall(!!!).

It was wonderful to see so much effort being put into discerning what God might be planning for Lexden and West Colchester. This is something to which everyone is invited to contribute, however. So please ponder these things, if you have the opportunity: What do *you* value about St Leonard's? What do you see God growing, and what needs do you see in our communities? What are the pressures on St Leonard's, where are things changing in terms of resources and people's involvement and engagement? What are *your* dreams for St Leonard's and how might we get there?

If you weren't able to be at the Parish Away Day, please reflect these questions – and let us know what comes to you!

LEXDEN LADIES



At our June meeting Alice Goss presented an interesting talk on her research into the genealogy of Sir Thomas Stamford Raffles, the founder of Singapore, and his namesake who was rector of St. Leonard's.

Alice had collected an impressive amount of material on the former, who was born aboard his father's ship, the Ann, off the coast of Jamaica in 1781. His father's trading business had problems and the family returned to England where Thomas was sent to boarding school. At 14, he began work in London as a clerk for the East India Company.

He had an adventurous life in the East Indies where he was appointed Governor in a number of districts and founded Singapore. He was also a keen biologist, collecting plants and animals, becoming the first President of the Zoological Society; and founded London Zoo.

He married twice and fathered 5 children with his second wife, Sophia. All his children sadly predeceased him but the family line continued through cousins down to Thomas Stamford Raffles, rector of St. Leonard's from 1914 to 1926, whose memorials to him and his wife Cecily are found in the church. Alice had very little information on this Thomas as his family were reluctant to share it with her. Thank you Alice for all your work.

On July 2nd at 2.30 pm in the Nicholls room we shall welcome David Acksteiner, our Youth Worker, who will be finishing his year with us in July. Do come and hear him. All welcome. ***Please note that this talk replaces the previously planned lunch at The Barn.***



WHAT A WONDERFUL WORLD



On 23rd April this year I flew out to the Philippine Islands with my son and his girlfriend. Gemma's parents and her family live in the remote village of Macayo on the island of Luzon. We stayed in Gemma's newly built house, very close to her parents' house. It was such a privilege to have the opportunity to meet her parents and to experience such a vastly different way of life.

After a few hours' stopover in Dubai we flew on to the Philippines. On approaching the Islands I was overwhelmed at the beauty which came into view. After an 18 hour flight I was looking forward to what I knew would be a wonderful experience for the next two weeks.

No hot water, no mod-cons, clothes washed in a tub outside and hung straight on the line to dry, cooking done on the barbecue, and numerous tropical storms, when the water and power are not available (only rain water and candles!) What a joy to see and experience the simplicity and acceptance of these extreme weather conditions in this part of the world

with those who have so little, are not at all materialistic and yet are so happy. Family life and togetherness are so important and a joy to see. The main form of travel in the villages is the tricycle. This is used for visits to the supermarket (a rare occasion) when as many as five people travel on, and in it, and boxes of shopping are carried home on the back and roof of the tricycle! 'Local shops' are mobile tricycles laden with goods which stop at each house.

We visited a beautiful church in Manaoag, Panastine: Or Lady of Manaoag, a Roman Catholic title for the Virgin Mary. We attended a Mass in this beautiful church which was so moving and full of love for all nations.

I was so impressed by the love, friendship and hospitality offered to me by the family, friends and neighbours in Macayo during my visit. After two weeks it was time for us to leave. With so many memories to bring home with me, I will always remember my visit to the Philippines with love and affection, and I give thanks for such a wonderful opportunity and experience.

Our world really is 'A Wonderful World.'
