# Brexit, the dangers of cannibalism, and the fruits of the spirit.

The Apostle Paul once warned, 'If you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.' Sadly, in contemporary Britain cannibalism seems back in fashion. I don't mean *literal* cannibalism, of course, but a tendency to regard others not as humans, but as meat.

Amid the political crises around Brexit, we've often been encouraged to view each other as meat. And I doubt I'm alone in feeling tenderised by the relentless blows of confident – but contradictory – claims. The deep social divisions that have appeared have gifted us the opportunity to reacquaint ourselves with the delicious possibilities of taking a little nibble out of each other here, and a bite out of one another there.

Society has been split into opposing flavours so that the feasting can begin. We're regularly told who we should be biting, and who will chomp us. Young versus old, rich versus poor, London versus the North, metropolitan liberals versus economic libertarians, urban versus rural, Scotland versus England, class versus class, ethnic group versus ethnic group. The table is laid. Shall we tuck in?!

Paul had a meaty phrase for this tendency to figurative cannibalism: 'works of the flesh'. Among them he lists some very popular bad habits: 'enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy'. Think of them as a range of cutlery spread in front of us to help us feast.

It's against all this that Paul wrote: 'if you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.' The damage we do to one another, the damage done to relationships between groups, is only the beginning of a slow death. Because, of course, meat is only meat

once the body is no more. If we treat other people and groups in this way then, frankly, we treat the social body of Britain as if it is dead already. Yet even now there is great hope: hope that comes from recognising that each of us is called to share in God's work of healing and reconciliation. Instead of the works of the flesh, we have the fruits of the spirit: 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.' Such fruits build up individuals and communities: they nourish the body, and they can heal.

Paul was not, of course, trying to rid the early churches of difference – he was trying to encourage all nations and backgrounds into the body of Christ. To him, difference need not threaten the community: because 'all of you are one in Christ Jesus.' Being in Christ Jesus means receiving the fruits of the Spirit: 'Patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control' which breathe life into relationships and communities, and which we must each practice now for the sake of all those around us.

When we encounter those with whom we profoundly disagree, we should respond with patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. This isn't a tolerance that leaves wounds undressed and festering, but a way of refusing to demean the other while challenging them if they're wrong. If we really try to understand those we disagree with, sitting with them, listening with patience and humility, arguing generously and gently, looking for any good in their position, exercising self-control when confrontation arises, and trying to persuade in a manner that shows that we too are at least open to the possibility of persuasion ourselves – well, then we are acting in love, in a manner that can establish peace.

Whatever the coming months bring, let's reject cannibalism and choose the path to reconciliation and community that runs through patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.
