The experience became all the more dizzying as a PA system began pumping out the inexplicably popular music of Shakin' Stevens, and a Pantomime dame driving a mobility scooter covered in lights nearly knocked me off my feet.

Oh no...

It can't be, surely not?

To my horror, it dawned on me that I had stumbled into my very worst nightmare: The Annual Christmas Lights Switch-On.

I mumbled to myself my usual objections that "I'm still wearing my poppy; I haven't even prepared my Advent sermon yet; and — it's getting so early; I presume these are the Christmas lights for 2028?" So, let's encourage each other to show all people what the light of Christ looks like this Advent and Christmas – in who we are, and in what we do and say. Let's not stand off as Scrooges scowling in the corner but embrace the spirit of celebration and hope and try to show people that perfect hope and perfect light we find in the birth of the Baby Jesus.







From the Archives

The following is the concluding part of the summary from the PCC minutes that appeared in the last magazine and covers the years 1941-1965.

1941

It was ordered that all churches were to remain open day and night. The church was issued with 6 2-gallon cans of water, 12 sandbags and a stirrup pump. The Parish Hall was to be let for dances but only to approved persons with takings going to local charities. Also, the Hall could be used by the WI on a Sunday night for a Rest and Recreation Centre for troops.

1942

During the Harvest Festival Service, the bellows on the Church organ broke down. It was decided that the surpluses of the Choirmen should be washed twice a year but those of the boys four times a year.

1943

It was decided to continue the Parish magazine despite a reduction in the paper available. A new organ blower (Mr. Alexander) was appointed. Although by the end of the year an electric blower was donated.

<u>1944</u>

The King's call for prayer and dedication to be used on the evening of D-Day

1945

A committee set up to raise funds for post war repairs as soon as possible. The church clock was to strike the hour again.

Churchyard closed for new graves. The war memorial was updated to include 1939 -45. An application for German POWs to cut the grass was unsuccessful. Childrens services would continue on the first Sunday of the month. The Rector was 'afraid we should be compelled to follow the example of other churches and increase the number of women in the choir'. A window in memory of PWG Papillon was installed. Mr Uff the organist was asked to resign due to old age. Mr Simpson was approached but declined.

1947

Mr Horace Hall was appointed as organist. Choir boys were paid 3d, per week, with a bonus for good boys.

1948

Priest stalls carved by Mabbitts in memory of the mother of Elfreda Sanders were dedicated. Chancel lighting was improved.

1950

Church Fete was held in Lexden Park at the beginning of July. The Rector went to Australia, his place was taken by Revd. W.J.B. Claydon. At his first meeting he proposed new hymn and prayer books, a rota and duties for sidesmen, monthly sung Eucharist, improved evening services and a Youth club. A dedication of the columbarium in memory of Major Phillip Papillon; given by his brother David Papillon; to be run by a private company.

1951

Pews moved to allow fitting of new radiators. Revd Claydon departed and was replaced by Revd Cooper and Revd Benson. Mr Hall the organist was asked to resign after difficulties with Revd Claydon and the choir boys. Mr Wendon was appointed in his place.

1952

In October a sacred concert at Endsleigh School starring Sandy McPherson was held in aid of church redecoration. The whole church was redecorated with the total removal of all stencilling. A service was held in memory of the late King

It was decided that it was impracticable to install televisions in the church for the coronation. The Rector Revd Dolph was appointed Rural Dean.

1954

The Rector recovered from a serious illness. In June and July, the Rector went to the USA. The church celebrated 1300 years since the arrival of St Cedd.

1955

The church gave the alter with plaque to the new St Cedds church.

<u>1956</u>

A request from the WI for a reduced charge to hire the Parish Hall was refused.

<u>1957</u>

The Rector broke his leg in a road accident but only missed two services. Mr Beecham the Bell ringer for over 50 years resigned and was presented with a clock at the Harvest Festival. Annual church service for the Church of England's Childrens Society was held. Winston Bently was appointed Bell Ringer.

<u> 1958</u>

Revd Dolph the Rector died because of a lightning strike whilst playing golf. His ashes were placed under a marble slab near the Altar. As parts of the parish had been lost the stipend was reduced to below the Diocese standard. This was made up by the Diocese with the parish undertaking to pay the Rectory rates. Christmas services were taken by Mr Cooper and Dr. Burnet.

1959

Revd Tassell instituted by the Bishop of Chelmsford. PCC increased from 12 to 16 members.

1960

Revd Tassell made Mayors Chaplain, started training as a marriage guidance councillor.

Carillon abandoned; Mr Wendon resigned as parish organist. Revd D.A. Evans was made assistant priest.

1962

Number of sidemen increased. Death of Sir Percy Sanders, he left £500 pounds to be invested for the fabric of the church and £500 for the churchyard.

1963

New oak font donated by Miss M. Beattie 1964

Mr. Teggin appointed verger to be assisted by Mr. Hill.

<u> 1965</u>

Resignation of Revd Tessell and Revd. Evans




