## Journeying Through Lent

## Dear Friends,

As I write this, I recall a recent sermon I gave about being a child of God; the time of Lent offers us the opportunity to take time to reflect, study and grow as children of God. It is a season that embraces so many emotions as we prepare ourselves for the dramatic and sacred events of Holy Week.

Lent is a 40-day period of time leading up to Easter that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. The word "Lent" comes from the old English word 'lencten' that means lengthen - referring to the season of spring and longer daylight hours; a symbolic time of growth as spring emerges all around us. The length of Lent also represents the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness before beginning his ministry. Lent for the children of God, should be a time of spiritual renewal and reflection in preparation of observing Good Friday, the death of Jesus and celebrating Easter, the resurrection of Jesus.

Lent presents the opportunity to draw closer to God through prayer, repentance, and self-examination. Many Christians choose to fast or give up certain indulgences as a form of self-discipline and penance. Whatever we choose to do let us all take time to prepare ourselves for the two most important days of the Christian year - Good Friday and Easter. Lent is a time that offers us an opportunity to come to terms with the human condition we may spend the rest of the year running from,

bringing our need for a Saviour to the forefront. Lent is a time to open the doors of our hearts a little wider and understand our Lord a little deeper so that when Good Friday and Easter come, it is not just another day at church but an opportunity to receive the overflowing graces God has to offer.

I look forward to journeying through Lent with you and growing as a child of God.

They were also thrilled to have plenty of pieces of buttered hot cross buns and some excellent cakes.



The Dads, of course, looked after the drinks; homemade elderberry wine, acorn beer and elderflower cordial for the youngsters.

Once the food had been given full justice the grown-ups settled down to natter and catch up on all their news. Games were organised for the youngsters, leap mouse, pin the tail on the cat. Musical chairs, statues to name but a few!



When the youngsters were hot and tired and the Mums were refreshing them with delicious cordial and a sit down, the choir and band led a jolly sing song. This was followed by dancing (to you and I it would look like a roomful of mice jumping up and down!)

All good things must come to an end and the very tired and happy mice trooped off to their previously prepared nests and soon all that could be heard were little yawns and snuffling noises.

Once again the mice community had enjoyed a wonderful Easter.

## A TRIBUTE TO MARGARET SHEPHERD

Margaret's family have kindly given us permission to reproduce the Eulogy given by her daughters Elizabeth and Caroline at her funeral.

#### **Good Afternoon**

For those of you who don't know, my name is Elizabeth, and this is my sister, Caroline, and Margaret was our Mum.

We would like to thank you all for being here today, as we remember our Mum, as she requested, with a service of thanksgiving and hope.

Sadly, due to his health, Owen is unable to be here today but we are comforted by the fact that he sat with his beloved Margaret, holding her hand, not long before her passing. Margaret died peacefully in her sleep at Milton Lodge Residential Home, with Caroline by her side, aged 89.

Margaret was born Margaret Evelyn Rand on 5 Jan 1935 – second daughter to Leonard and Priscilla. Sadly, her sister, Ruth, died at a young age. Mum's parents both died before we were born so there was no immediate family to speak of. To have her own family meant everything to her, dedicating the rest of her life to being a wife and mother.

Before this though, Mum was a thoroughly modern lady – way ahead of her time. She worked as a nanny at Dr Barnardo's orphanage, rode a scooter and travelled overseas visiting Norway, Switzerland, and Mallorca to name a few and judging by some of the photos we have a found, had a thoroughly good time! She definitely lived her younger years to the fullest and would have experienced more than most of her contemporaries. During this time, she became a full-time live-in nanny to the Hill family of Coggeshall, caring for young Christopher and Caroline Hill from a very early age until they went to boarding school,

creating many special childhood memories for them. Caroline has remained in contact with Mum ever since and is here today with her brother, Christopher, and told us "Our parents came and went, Margaret was always there. I've always felt so lucky she was part of our childhood, a wonderful person to have been looked after by".

Mum and Dad met through their shared love of music and singing – both being members of the Braintree Choral Society and married in April 1972 at St Peters Church, in Coggeshall - "best days work I ever did" said Dad, on a regular basis!

It wasn't long before they both had their hands full with the two of us! And the years that followed are full of fond memories – family holidays, long walks to pick blackberries, bike rides, card games, jigsaw puzzles and slide shows. Life seemed simple back then. Mum was always there. We felt safe, secure, and carefree, and even though times were often tough, she never let on and we never went without. Mum was a LEGEND. She was kind, generous, patient, hardworking, easy going, savvy, selfless, practical, artistic, and creative – with a wicked sense of humour.

She very rarely relaxed – and when she did sit down there would always be something in her hands – a crossword or cross stitch, knitting needles or a crochet hook. Meals were always home cooked, fresh cakes and biscuits in the pantry, homemade jams filled the cupboard and Christmas was a veritable feast of everything made from scratch.

Mum was creative and artistic. She played the piano and sang in the church choir. She was a whizz on a sewing machine and made most of our clothes. I remember being so excited when we were allowed to choose the paper patterns from the haberdashery. I'm not sure I was so keen on the matchy matchy clothes we were often dressed in! We also had hand knitted cardigans, jumpers, scarves, and mittens. Dad is still modelling much of her work. In her later years she enjoyed cross stitch and even had her work exhibited.

She also loved the outdoors, walked everywhere, and enjoyed gardening. Honeysuckle, roses, spring bulbs, tomatoes and rhubarb filled the back garden, though I'm not sure the green thumb gene got passed down to us.

Mum also had a great sense of humour that was always at the ready. She was quick witted and loved a good laugh. One particular day, we had been complaining that the soup we had been served for dinner looked boring. She promptly grabbed some food colouring and we all got blue soup for dinner!

Mum held our family together. She was the CEO, the Finance Officer and Operations Manager, and put everyone before herself. She was courageous and brave, and never ever complained. Even when she fell and broke her hip whilst hanging out the washing, she managed to get back inside the house and finish the dishes before taking herself to the walk-in centre to get checked out.

Once Caroline and I were both at school, Mum started working again. She started off working as a dinner lady at our school – St James Primary School where she was known as Evelyn as there were 3 Margarets in one small kitchen! Later, she worked at Woodlands, a day centre for people with learning disabilities, and then in the coffee shop at Guntons. Her jobs allowed her to meet people from all walks of life, make lifelong friends and there was always time for a chat!

The Church was also very important to Mum – a lifelong Christian and regular church goer firstly at St James the Great before moving here to St Leonards. Maragaret was a well-known and well-loved member of the choir up until she moved with Dad into the care home in June 2021. The music, hymns and readings today were all chosen by Margaret, and her choices reflect her faith and her love.

We are so proud to be your daughters – we have a lot to live up to but couldn't have asked for a better Mum.

I thought it would be helpful to give you a bit of information about each of these charities, this month it's Colchester Foodbank.



Every day people in the UK go hungry for reasons ranging from redundancy to receiving an unexpected bill on a low income. A simple box of food makes a big difference, with foodbanks helping prevent crime, housing loss, family breakdown and mental health problems.

Colchester Foodbank is part of The Trussell Trust's network of 428 Foodbanks, working to tackle food poverty and hunger in our local communities, as well as across the UK.

The Foodbank Network was founded in 2004 after four years of developing the original Foodbank based in Salisbury. Since then The Trussell Trust has helped communities work together to launch Foodbanks nationwide in a wide range of towns and cities.

In 2022/23, food banks in the Trussell Trust's network provided 2,986,203 three-day emergency food supplies and support to UK people in crisis. Of these, 1,139,553 were distributed for children.



## A TRIBUTE TO JEAN HALLETT

Jean's family have kindly given us permission to reproduce the tribute given at her funeral.

Jean was born in Billericay in 1938 to Cairns and Doris Burgess who had met at Barclays Bank in the 1920s and moved around Essex with his job.

Along with her older brother John, the family spent the war living above Barclays in Ingatestone where Jean talked about happy times despite all that was going on in the world. Her Dad was in the Home Guard, and she remembers going to the air-raid shelter and also seeing a Doodlebug fly past the window when sitting in the Dentist chair.

Her Dad's family were Scottish, and they had many friends in the farming community with Jean taking part in Scottish Dancing competitions. She was close to her cousins Ian and Jane who lived in Shenfield.

The family followed her Dad round the country as he competed for Essex at bowls and took many trips up to Scotland to see relatives, Jean said it seemed to "take days to get there"! They moved to Chelmsford after the war where Jean went first to St Anne's and then to the High school where she met several lifelong friends, two of whom - Mary-Anne and Maureen - are here today.

When she left school Jean trained as a secretary and went to work for Strutt and Parker in Chelmsford before going to London to work for Central Mining and another friend - Jenny - from that time is also with us in the church.

Jean met her future husband John at Young Farmers Club, and their first date was to see the international tennis at Wembley, John had asked Jean's Dad if he could surprise her and meet her off the train

from London. Apparently he took her to a transport cafe on the way and the spoons were attached to the tables with string! But she must have been impressed because they got engaged in 1961 and were married in September 1964 at Writtle Church, and we have a few wedding guests here today including John's sister Mary and her husband Nicholas.

They bought their first home together in Hollywood Close, Great Baddow and neighbours June, Gill and John are also in the church with us.

Two sons came along, Robert in 1967 and Richard in 1969, and in 1972 they move to Oaklea Avenue in Springfield with Jean's parents living just round the corner. In 1975 Jean's father passed away and they sold up and moved to Larch Hill, Fryerning Lane, Ingatestone which allowed Jean's Mum to have her own rooms and space. They had many happy years in that house with its large garden and tennis court and where Robert and Richard grew up and called home. Great friends from those days Margaret, Sylvia and Roma are here today.

Jean knew a large number of people in Ingatestone, Robert used to dread going shopping with her knowing that a 10-minute trip would turn into over an hour by the time Mum had spoken to everyone she met!

Jean had many lifelong friends from school, work, golf, tennis and Church and made some lasting friendships in Chelmsford, Ingatestone and Colchester later in life which she cherished. Kay, Kerry, Rosemary and Jean to name but a few!

Jean and John celebrated their golden wedding in 2014 and John passed away shortly after, Jean always though that John was determined to hold on to make that milestone.

Jean went to Australia with her brother after her John died and had some lovely holidays with her friend Jean Holden including trips to Switzerland and a cruise down the Adriatic where she broke her hip and Robert had to go and help repatriate her - Jean Holden stayed with her the entire time making sure she was looked after.

Jean became ill around 5 years ago but even as her health deteriorated she remained positive and cheerful throughout, she was always a glass half full person. When she couldn't look after herself any longer she moved into Cheviot nursing home where she received excellent care and where there weren't enough days in the week for the many visitors she received!

Jean loved most sports and had a passion for playing and watching tennis. She was a useful player and was so thrilled to be able to play with her grandsons on her 80th birthday. John was an avid golfer and when he retired Jean thought she might not see him so much so took up golf and was a member of Chelmsford and then Colchester golf clubs for many years. Jean loved gardening, flower arranging and learned to play bridge. She was very competitive and particularly enjoyed playing scrabble with Jean Holden in later life, although I think she wished she could have won a bit more often!

Jean had a strong faith and was a lifelong churchgoer and member of the Mothers Union. She got involved in all aspects of Church life wherever her and John lived including cleaning the church and flower arranging for both church and hospice. She also coordinated the local collections for the Children's Society when living in Ingatestone.

Above all she loved her family and was so proud of her sons Robert and Richard and her four grandchildren George, Charlie, Katie and Milly and delighted in hearing about their achievements and what they were up to.

Jean was devoted to John throughout their 50 years of marriage and cared for him through his long illness and went to visit him in Alderwood care home every day.

She will be remembered by her friends and family as a loving, caring, positive lady who always put others before herself.

## Film Review – One Life

This is the moving and true story of Sir Nicholas Winton, a London stockbroker, who organised the evacuation of 669 Jewish children from Nazi



occupied Prague in 1938 and 1939. It would have been more, but Nazi soldiers brutally intervened to stop the last train leaving.

The film starts with Winton visiting a friend in Prague where Jewish children, hungry and cold, were detained in camps. "How will they survive?" he asks. "They probably won't" comes the reply. It is enough to spur him into action; obtaining visas for the children, finding volunteer families willing to take the children in and willing to pay the £50 deposit demanded by the British government – a lot of money in those days.

There are heartbreaking scenes of children saying their goodbyes before the train departs, not realising that they will never see their parents again.

The young Winton is played by Johnny Flynn, the older Winton by Anthony Hopkins who carries with him for the rest of his life the pain and regret for all the children he was unable to save. Winton himself was born to Jewish parents. The whole family converted to Christianity, and he was baptised into the Church of England.

In 1988 Sir Nicholas was interviewed by Esther Rantzen on her Sunday evening programme That's Life (anyone remember it?) This event is reenacted in the film; Esther invites those people in the audience who were Kindertransport children to stand up and the whole audience rises to their feet.

"In as much as you did it to one of the least of my brothers and sisters you did it unto me".

## From the Archives

Last month we looked at the voting record of the Revd Preston in the 1833 General Election. Remember it is the Revd Preston we must thank for being the driving force in building the present St Leonards. But going through the documentation we hold I came across information from the Vestry records for the parish dated 1813 to 1825. These records give interesting insights as to what was going on at the time regarding the church. Revd Preston became the Rector at St Leonards in 1804 and would remain until his death in 1841.

#### **Vestry record for April 19th, 1813 (Easter Monday)**

For repairs to the Church. Including Whitewashing, and new painting £79.5.11 (today that would be £79.29p however in terms of today's values that would equal £8721.90 (depending on whose inflation calculation you use).

## **Vestry record for April 11th, 1813 (Easter Monday)**

For repairs to the church (details unspecified) £37.17.8 (£37.88)

## Vestry record for March 28th, 1817

Revd Preston Inherited the sum of £100 (in today's values this would have been around £11,000) from the estate of the late Mrs Anne Rawston (formerly Lord of the Manor) to be used at his discretion for the poor of the parish. Revd Preston said he intended to use the money to build a National School for the education of the Children of the poor of the Parish following the principles of the Church of England. It was Revd Preston's intention to use part or all the money to buy some land in Spring Lane to build the school.

Anne Rawston never married; the term Mrs was a curtesy title given to older women during that period. It derived from the term Mistress.

#### Vestry record March 30th, 1818

Revd Preston had purchased a piece of freehold land in Spring Lane from Mr William Kimble for £40 and the National School had been built. The school construction had cost £178.10.9 (£178.55) The ownership of the school was legally conveyed to Revd Preston and his successors, Rectors of this Parish for ever. This record is interesting as it gives details of those donating to the building of the school.

The following payments were made to Hurrel (bricks), Rouse (bricks), Nelson (bricklaying), Lewis (slates), Glanfield (painting), Coleman (stoves), Martin (Blacksmith), Hayward (carpentry), Polley (carting), Sutherland (beer)

One interesting point when looking at those involved with the building of the School is that the Carpentry was carried out by Henry Hayward Junior who was the son of the Churchwarden, Henry Hayward and his son will be very involved in the building of the new St Leonards.

#### Vestry record March 25th, 1819

Repairs to Church and Churchyard fence £70.17.10 (£70.89)
The Vestry records for 1820 are very involved and I will refer to them in the May /June magazine.


