Constancy in Change

As we enter the season of autumn, the parish of Lexden is in vacancy. The process of appointing a new priest always takes time, so it will be a while before someone new comes to Lexden, but as we look ahead to the future, we're bound to wonder what they will be like. Will they fit in? Will they want to change things? In the years during which I have been worshipping at St Leonard's there have been three different parish priests; some members of the congregation have known four or even five. All those priests brought their own individual styles and ideas to St Leonard's, and all served in different times and seasons, through many changes in the world and in the Church.

I remember the days when the only form of worship in the Church of England was the Book of Common Prayer, and Sunday services were conducted entirely by the priest; members of the congregation never read the lessons and or led the intercessions as they do now; and until 1994 all priests were male. Changes to those long-established practices were perceived by some at the time as a threat to the integrity of the Church, yet now we take them for granted. At St Leonard's there was even division over how comfortable the congregation should expect to be during the service: not everyone approved when pew cushions were installed! Before the extension was built in 2008, the entrance to the church was through heavy, forbidding doors, with poorly lit steps, and inside there was no running water or toilet. But thanks to the bold vision of the then Rector and PCC, and the commitment of the congregation, we now enjoy bright, level access, a flexible space and modern facilities. The church building was adapted and updated, and in

the process, its beauty and holiness, far from being compromised, were enhanced. The power of our faith was affirmed and strengthened to serve in contemporary culture.

Technology has continued to develop at a pace and in ways we could never have envisaged. During the pandemic that technology suddenly became vital, in order for us to stay alive as a church. Creative measures brought about some lasting changes which have broadened and enriched church life. We found new ways to worship, serve and connect as a community: The Friendship Line is now established, and we continue to livestream services from church, making worship more accessible for those unable to attend in person.

Change has not compromised our integrity, and as we look forward to welcoming our next parish priest, we'll keep on serving in the name of Christ in this place and beyond; and each of us has a part to play. The Church is, as St Paul tells us, one body, dependent on all the different parts in order to function. (Romans 12.4-8, 1 Corinthians 12.) Without us there is no Church. Christian ministry takes many and varied forms, whether it's helping to clean the church, serving on the PCC, making regular donations, or simply talking to someone new and making them feel welcome. See the notice board in the extension for more suggestions! St Leonard's lives and flourishes through the love of its members.

So, during this vacancy, we'll draw on wisdom gained from past experience, we'll recognise and encourage the talents and potential in one another, and we'll continue to be a steadfast and reliable Church. And in all this, we'll have as our guide the One who is constant and unchanging, but who is always relevant and contemporary. Jesus is the Church's one foundation, the Word in whom we can trust. He continues to inspire, love and support us through all life's times and changes, as long as we keep him in our sight.





Liturgical Colours

I've been asked by a couple of people lately why we change the colours of our robes and church hangings and so I thought that it might be a good time to put a piece in the magazine. The exact days when these colours are worn in the Church can be found on the Church of England website. It lists all the different saints and festivals, and which colours should be used but the following is the basic explanation:

White symbolises celebration. It's used for joyful occasions like Christmas and Easter, when gold can also be used. White is also used for special events like baptisms, weddings and confirmations. It is also used for child's funeral, which I know is neither celebratory nor joyful but it's to do with purity.

Red represents the Holy Spirit (the Fire of Pentecost) and Martyrdom (blood), so you'll see it used at Pentecost, on the feast days of martyred saints and as we recall Jesus' suffering and death in Holy Week.

Purple symbolises repentance and preparation, which is why you will see it during Advent and Lent. It is often worn at funerals as well.

Green symbolises growth and hope. It is the colour of Ordinary Time – the period between Epiphany and Lent and between Easter and Advent.

I do think that the words 'growth' and 'hope' for the time we wear Green does sound better than 'Ordinary time' which sounds a bit mundane.

And so, as you will see, it's not a matter of which colour do I fancy wearing this week; the colours are dictated by the Church and are very specific to the particular time of year. They are an outward sign of the season that the Church is in.


Friendship Lunch returns on 13th September

Families and Children at St Leonard's What's on in September and October?

Well, the answer is that there is something for everyone!

For the youngest children and their carers St Leonard's Baby and Toddler group starts again on Wednesday 10th September in the hall. We run two identical sessions at 9.30am and 11.00am each Wednesday in term time. We usually start the autumn term by having fun with our Harvest theme of tractors, farms and sensory play. No need to book, just turn up.

Junior Church runs at 9.45am on most Sundays and is aimed at school-age children. The children explore bible stories in a reflective and creative way and then rejoin the service towards the end. For those who are younger we have a special place at the back of the church with books and toys, and where parents can join in with the service. Our next Junior Church is Sunday 14th September.

Our next Messy Church takes place at 3pm on Sunday 21st September and is sure to be action packed with a Messy Senses theme. This is an informal family worship session with activities suitable for pre-school and primary school children. We share some of the classic stories or themes of the Bible through crafts, songs and worship. At the end we all sit down together to share a meal. Messy Church takes place five or six times a year.

Brick Club usually takes place on Tuesday mornings during the school holidays from 10am – 12 noon in the hall. This is an opportunity for pre-school and primary age children to have fun building creatively with Lego. Carers can join in or have a chat with friends. Refreshments are provided and there is no charge for the session.

Finally, our SLYC youth group is aimed at children in Year 4 and above and our first session this term is at 3pm in the hall on Sunday 12th October. This group is an active session with games and activities. We like to think about ways we can help in the world, and to share our experiences of faith and life. Most of all we like to have fun! And there's a Tuck Shop!

From the Archives

Pelham Rawston Papillon DSO (1864 - 1940)

The last true Lord of the Manor, he was born in London but spent much of his youth at Lexden, due to his father's political links to Colchester. As a young man he was interested in Archaeology and in the grounds of the manor found an ivory carving of a Gladiator from Roman time, This was donated to the British Museum and is on display. (Why not Colchester's Museum?) He went to Oxford and studied law and played County Cricket for Sussex. Pelham was always destined for the military and served in the Royal Sussex Regiment. He was active in the 2nd Boar war and served under Lord Kitchener, being mentioned in dispatches in Kitchener's final communique of 23rd June 1902.

In 1914 he invited the Revd Thomas Stamford Raffles to be the Rector of St Leonards. Raffles was a direct descendant of the Raffles who set up Singapore in 1819. At the outbreak of WWI in 1914, when he was in his 50s, he was tasked with commanding the newly formed 13th battalion of the 3rd Essex Regiment known as the West Ham Battalion (a Pals Battalion). He was respected by the men and looked after their needs. The 1^{st of} July 1916 was the first day of the Somme offensive, a battle that would last for most of the year. He was wounded while leading his men over the top at Deville Wood, refused help and continued to lead. The following day he was again wounded. For this action he received the DSO and the citation appeared in the London Gazette of 20th October 1916.

He had little to do with Lexden after that, it appears that his younger brother (Harold Garnier) inherited the advowson and used it to appoint the Rectors including SL Dolph. However, Harold died in 1930, 10 years

prior to his older brother Pelham. The Advowson and the title Lord of the Manor went to Harold's eldest son David Pelham Papillon. David never married although it was announced in the Tatler that he had become engaged, but this had been broken off. It was also reported that at one time he was seen with a young Margaret Roberts who was quite keen on him. Margaret Roberts went on to marry a Denis Thatcher and became the country's first female Prime minister.

Pelham Rawston's military ranks were all acting apart from when he became a lieutenant. It was not until 27th July 1927 that his final rank of Lieut. Colonel was confirmed in the London Gazette and signed off by the Lord Lieutenant of Sussex.

Harold Garnier Papillon who held the Benefice married later in life and had two children with his wife Elizabeth. However, the family had fallen on hard times and money was tight. It appeared that when Harold died it looked as though the manor would have to be sold. But at the last minute his widow married a Mr Lawrence and all was saved. However, with David not marrying and producing an heir and his younger brother being killed in Normandy in June 1944 the family line died out in 1977. Thus ending 900 years of history.



The Bishop of Chelmsford, the Rt Rev Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani is encouraging church congregations in Chelmsford Diocese to take part in a day of prayer for peace in the Middle East on Sunday 21 September.

The day of prayer is being organised to coincide with the UN's International Day of Peace, and all Church of England congregations have been invited to participate.

Bishop Guli said:

"I have had the opportunity to visit and spend time with our friends in the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem on two occasions during this conflict. They emphasised the important role we have to play in the Church of England in speaking out and praying for a just peace. I encourage congregations across Chelmsford Diocese to use the prayer the Archbishop in Jersualem has written for 21 September, which prays for an immediate end to the war, the release of all captives, help for those suffering hunger and starvation in Gaza and beyond and the resumption of negotiations for a just and lasting peace."

Prayer material and other information will be made available on special pages of the ecumenical groups Churches Together in England and Churches Together in Britain and Ireland.

Further events and opportunities for church engagement are planned for the coming months the details of which will be released in due course.

A prayer for the Holy Land

Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: In your mercy, provide for all those in Gaza and beyond who suffer from hunger and starvation, that they may be given both physical bread to nourish their bodies and heavenly bread to sustain their souls. By the power of your Spirit, bring a speedy end to this cruel war, the release of all captives, care for the sick and wounded, comfort for those who have lost loved-ones, and the opening of a pathway for a just and lasting peace here in the very homeland where your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, ministered during his earthly life; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.


Have You been Bereaved?


