Let these next couple of months be a journey for you – not to the shops and back, not overspending on gifts and food which will get you into debt before the new year has started. But a journey with God and a journey that will enhance your understanding of your faith, that will strengthen your faith.

I know many people don't like the darkness that overtakes the evenings of winter, but perhaps when you can't get out into the garden you can sit in the warm with a book, one that you wouldn't find time to read in the business of Summer; again one that will help you with your faith journey.

I think that it is just a little too early to wish you a Happy Christmas, but I do wish you a wonderful Advent, full of inspiration and joy.



### From the Church Wardens

### **Update on Roof Repairs**

We are pleased to inform you that we have received permission from the Diocese to proceed with repairs to the roof of the main body of the church. As we are now late into the year it is unlikely, but not certain, that work will not start until the new year at the earliest. The first indications that work has started will be when the Church roof has been covered in a large tarpaulin tent. We are fortunate to have the funds to cover the cost of the repairs but it will dip into our already suffering reserves so we will be looking to fund raise either by grants or donations so a fund-raising committee will be formed to help us cover the cost. More on this later.

### Slope to the Church Hall

When our church Hall was opened in the late 60's the slope was not seen as a problem but as years have gone by the slope has become a problem, not just for the elderly and those with mobility problems but to young mums with pushchairs and prams. What we are intending and with the agreement of the PCC is to split the slope in two, with one half being stepped and the other side re surfaced. It is felt that if gradual steps are introduced it will make things easier for many age groups. Of course, it was not felt necessary in the 60's to step the slope as the majority who used the slope to the hall were young, hindsight is a wonderful thing. We are thankful that we have received some funding so that we can begin ground searches and as this is an access issue we should be able to secure further funding by looking at grants. We also intend to level the walkway between the Hall and the Garden of Remembrance this will enable us to complete the child play area outside of the hall for which plans already exist.


## CHILDREN'S SOCIETY BOX OPENING

## **Vacancy Update**

During a vacancy, Churchwardens share the overall responsibility for the church and its worship activities with the Area Dean.

Following the Matt's departure in late July, the PCC had a meeting with the Bishop of Colchester, the Archdeacon of Colchester, the Area Dean and the Lay Chair to discuss the way forward.

The meeting was constructive and laid out what we had to do. The first step is to write what is called a Parish Profile which explains who we are and what we are seeking in a new Priest in Charge. Once that has been completed and accepted an advert for the vacancy can be listed. Due to holidays, it was agreed that we would submit the Parish Profile by mid-November. Once accepted by the Arch Deacon, then the vacancy advertisement would be placed.

Then it is just a matter of waiting to see who wishes to be considered. In fairness to everyone who is new to this process, parishes can be without a Priest in Charge for a year or more. We will keep you up to date with progress during future magazines.

## **Fundraising**

Since COVID we have needed to draw on our reserves just to balance the books; this not sustainable and needs to be addressed. It is to be hoped that once we appoint a new Priest in Charge who will get out into the community we may see an increase in our electoral roll and with it an increase in monthly income. Our Electoral roll has dropped and with it our income, not that the two are directly linked but people on the roll do sign up to help us financially.

Anyone who would like to help on a committee to help raise funds (and it doesn't mean they have to run events), would be welcome. Ideas people giving new perspectives would be welcome. If interested, please contact Mike Firth via the office. We have already had some people express an interest in getting involved and will call a meeting for both committees in the near future.



By any farmer an his wife.



### From the Archives

During the eighteenth-century Lexden had been growing, and thanks to the work of various clerics the congregation had grown to an extent that the old Middle Age Church was too small. In theory it could have been enlarged and the ground stabilised but as detailed in an earlier archive, the Revd Preston decided that he needed a new church. Of course, this could not happen without the agreement of the Lord of the Manor.

Finance was already in place before the decision to demolish and rebuild had been taken. The new St Leonards was constructed very quickly and according to the plaque on the rear wall could hold 600 people. It would have been tight, but it must be remembered that in those days people were smaller in stature and much thinner. Betty Nichols, one time secretary to the PCC, in a piece written in 1991 stated that the 1820 church was built in the during the religious revival period and was built to what the Victorians would later call 'English Middle Pointed Gothic'.

From the outset there were problems with the church, the main problem being the shallowness of the chancel. In his essay on Essex Gothic Architecture. J.J. Stanton described St Leonard's as a Brick Box disguised as something medieval. Others described it as being jerry built, something we are now having to look at. In the late nineteenth century, the Church was described as having been built in the early years of the century, looked relatively good on the outside but internally was not really fit for purpose.

To this end, the then Rector and the Churchwardens, in conjunction with the Lord of the Manor, requested a faculty to enlarge the church from the Diocesan Bishop of St Albans in 1892, stating that 'it is ill adapted for public worship, large parts of the congregation cannot kneel or sit comfortably and the shallow Chancel is crowded with seats'. Reports also state that there was no room for a pipe organ so it must be assumed that music was provided by a harmonium. From the records it is confirmed that in 1890 seats were installed in the gallery as it had not been used by musicians for some time.

Plans for the extension were submitted along with the faculty, the architect was J.C.Traylon of Stamford whose design we see today was to transform the church. According to the records, the building of the new Chancel was not to interfere with any pews or vaults. It would be necessary a number of Gravestones and tablets; they were to be placed as near as possible to their original position once agreement had been reached with the family members. The remains of those people still lie beneath the Chancel. Their names are long forgotten but for the record they are Phillip Bailey d1828, Thomas Lambel d1829, Harriot Hobbs d1851, William Frost d1856, Henry Taylor d1873, William Home d 859, Joseph Taylor d1873, Edward Round d1877 and a tablet to the memory of Mr Hume d1852.

Edward Round is an interesting name as from previous research it was a member of the Round family who gave money to build the new St Leonards in 1820, were they related? Conjecture. Yet if they were it is somehow fitting.

My thanks must go to Betty Nichols who carefully maintained and copied original documents so this archive could be revealed.
