From the Church Wardens

Update on Roof Repairs

The latest on the Church Roof is that, as mentioned earlier, the builders hope to start work early in the new year. The first thing you will notice will be scaffolding going up around the main body of the Church. We understand this is a complex construction and will take some time. Once this is done then the main work to replace broken and missing slates can start. Our services will not be disrupted as the whole roof area will be covered in tarpaulins.

Although we do have money in our Fabric Fund to carry out the work, we will be looking to cover a proportion of the cost by applying for grants, fundraising and making appeals to the wider community for financial help. As you can imagine this is a very costly exercise and anything we can raise will be much appreciated.

Vacancy Update

We have been working hard on putting together our Parish Profile and are pleased to say that this has now been submitted to the Archdeacon and Area Dean for consideration. We are hopeful that the advert for the post of Priest in Charge at St Leonard's will be placed in the Church Times at the end of January or early February and that, should we receive some applications, interviews will take place after Easter. We will keep you up to date with progress during future magazines.

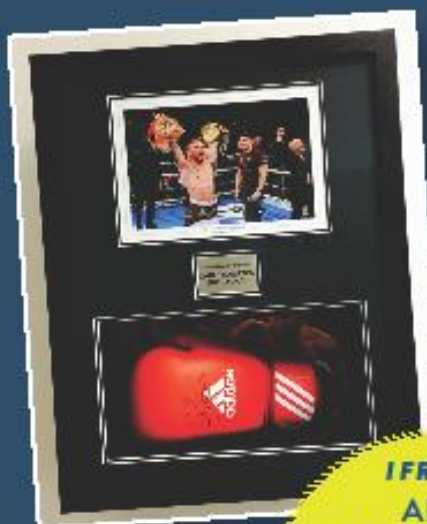
CHILDREN'S SOCIETY BOX OPENING

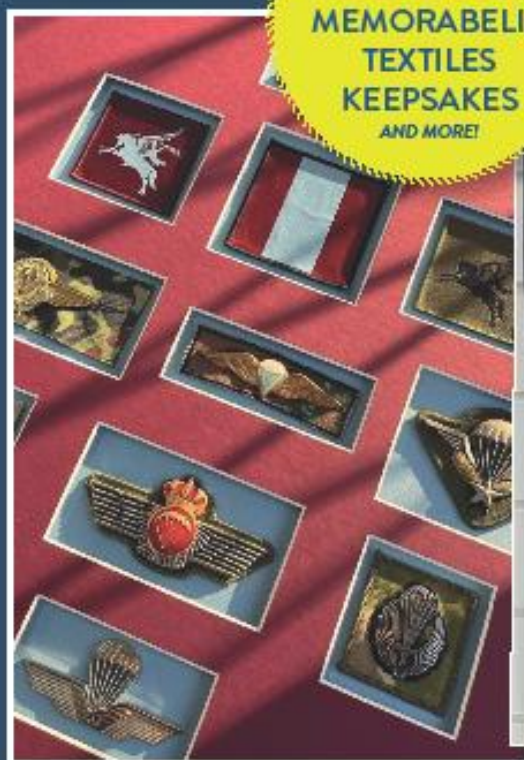
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New Hythe Hampers

A Winter News Round up from our Children and Young People.

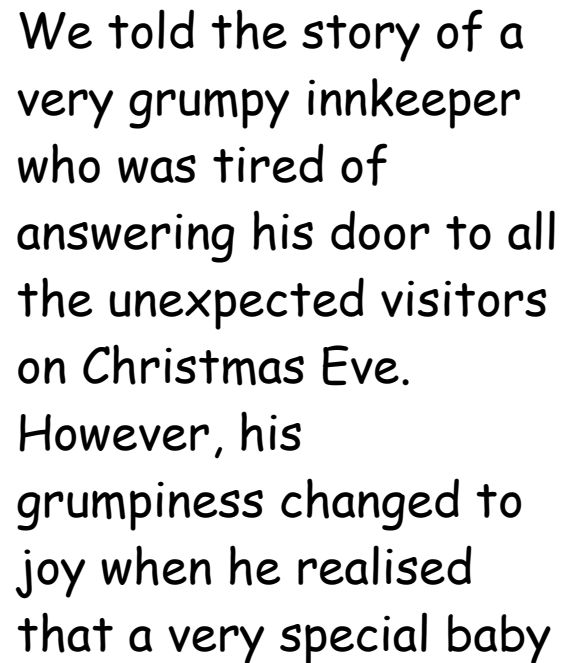
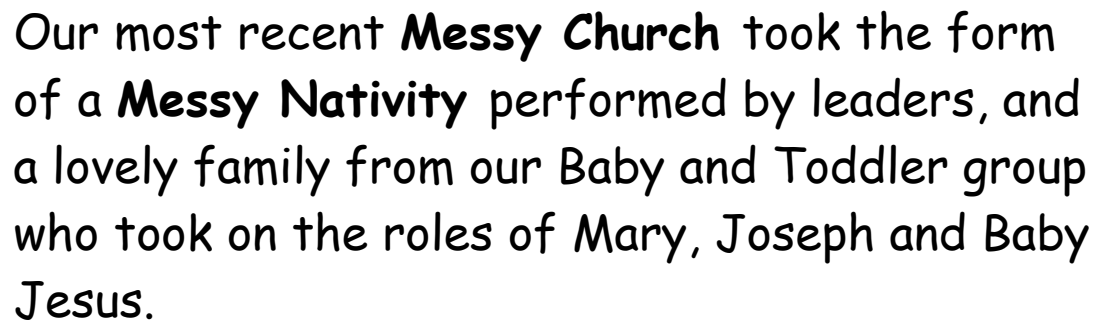

A New Year message from the Bishop of Chelmsford

The Right Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, the Bishop of Chelmsford, has written a New Year message for 2026:

It was a joy to meet Pope Leo in Rome in November of last year. The occasion was the declaration of Cardinal Newman as a Doctor of The Church, made all the more meaningful in the Jubilee Year, themed "Pilgrims of Hope". It seems to me that as we stand on the threshold of a New Year, we are called to travel this path of Hope together.

It's always a temptation to be drawn towards despair. A febrile political environment, the diminished standing of the Church, even our own weariness can lead us to forget that we are called to be people of Hope. Those whose Hope is in the Word made Flesh - the message that's been proclaimed in churches throughout our Diocese this Christmas period and because of which we can journey confidently into a new year.

And Hope abounds not just when all is well, not just in life's joys and successes. In his November message for World Day of the Poor, the Pope urges us to recognise those experiencing poverty as "witnesses to a strong and steadfast hope, precisely because they embody it in the midst of uncertainty, poverty, instability and marginalisation". That is not how a secular society usually measures Hope. Christian Hope has nothing to do with whether a successful outcome can be predicted but everything to do with the conviction of things not seen and the determination to travel well in times of uncertainty, for our Hope is in the one who renews all things.

In my Persian childhood we celebrated New Year on 21st March - a time of new life bursting forth at the Spring Equinox. Joyful though that remembrance is, I've also come to see the blessing of the western tradition - of the New Year coming at a time of darkness and even a certain bleakness. Every morning in the small chapel at Bishopscourt I see the words of St. John engraved on the stain glass window: Light Shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it.

Now that is Hope, and that is what I wish for you, your loved ones and your communities. May you have a happy and Hope-filled 2026.

We have printed below Viv's sermon from our Memorial Service held on 2nd November. Many people have remarked on how much it moved them and how perfectly it summed up what they were feeling so we thought it was worth reproducing for anyone who was unable to be there.

Today the Church celebrates All Souls Day. It's a day when we're invited to set aside some time to remember our departed loved ones, to reflect on their time in the world and all they meant to us, to give thanks to God for them, and to pray for the repose of their souls. And it's also a time when we can acknowledge our continuing sense of loss and sorrow.

That short Bible reading we heard from Revelation Chapter 21 is one to which we often turn for comfort in bereavement. When we have lost someone who was very dear to us, our hearts ache and we cast around in our minds for some way to make sense of it, in the desperate hope that we can somehow ease the pain. After the funeral, life goes on relentlessly around us, other people continue to go about their lives, as if nothing has changed, and for them nothing has; and even those who are close to us and aware of our situation seem all too soon to expect us to move on and get back to normal. But that old normality no longer exists; we can't go back; we have to adjust to living in this new reality.


Recently while I was recovering from surgery I watched a lot of daytime television. All the adverts seemed to be aimed at older people, and many were for 'no fuss' cremation plans. There's nothing wrong with wanting to make provision for when the time comes, but one advert particularly infuriated me. Two women are having a conversation and one says, 'Nobody likes funerals, do they?' I wanted to shout, 'Well of course we don't like them, but that doesn't mean we don't need them!' The death of a loved one is such a significant event that we want to acknowledge it; we want to honour and celebrate that person's life, to recognise the

part they played in the world and in our lives. We need to be able to express our grief and our sense of loss, and perhaps sometimes to address feelings of guilt or anger. And it's a time when we can say goodbye to them and commend them to God's safe keeping.

After the funeral it's a comfort to know that we've done our best for them and that they're now at rest. But we aren't at rest; we still have to carry on with our lives, but now it feels like more of an effort. There are gaps in our days which they used to fill, and now and then something unexpectedly catches us out, and brings on a surge of grief. Places visited together, social gatherings, a piece of music, or the sudden urge to tell them something; all these things remind us of our loss. We miss them, and it can be hard to see a way to enjoy life again. We may find ourselves feeling angry; angry with them for leaving us, and angry with God for letting us suffer. It's OK to cry out to God in our distress. We have a direct line to him, and nothing is too much for him to hear. In the Bible there are many occasions when people cry out to God in anguish, and the Psalms are full of lines like, 'God, where are you? Why aren't you listening?' 'When are you going to help me? And even Jesus, who was the Son of God, turned to the Psalms when he cried out from the cross to his Father, 'My God, why have you forsaken me?'

But Jesus and all those others before him persisted because they believed that God is loving, and never truly deserts us. They would have found comfort in another Psalm, number 40, which begins, 'I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry.' They knew that God doesn't abandon us, even when sometimes it can seem hard to find him. Before the birth of Jesus, people thought God was distant, stern and unapproachable, usually angry and quick to punish anyone who displeased him. But God wanted us to know that this was not what he was like, so he sent his Son Jesus Christ to live among us, to fully experience human life and emotions, as we do. God came and lived in the world, so we can trust that he truly understands our suffering.

God isn't just a far off observer of all our struggles and sorrows; he knows and loves us, and we believe our departed loved ones are with him. If we pray to him in our hearts, it can help us feel closer to them, and to God. We can tell him how we feel, and ask him to help us live on in this world without them. His response may not be obvious, but sometimes, if we keep asking, then something will come into our minds, which we may not even realise has come from God, but which helps us see a way forward. You are here this afternoon because grief doesn't end with the funeral, and that person is still, and will always be, part of your life. Our time in this world is brief; all we can do is make the most of it, cherishing memories and trusting in the love of God, knowing that those for whom we grieve now live on in with him in perfect peace, in a new life which for now we can only imagine, but which we too in our turn will enjoy. Amen.

From the Archives

In the November December edition of the magazine, I recounted the steps taken to enlarge our church to include a larger chancel and to improve the seating arrangements. This archive is a continuation and covers some of the processes that took place.

A Vestry minute of July 4th, 1892, had highlighted the problems with the Church built in 1821/2 and a further minute had drawn up a schedule of work: -

Section 1:- to cover the internal roof with wood, with the exception of the principal timbers

Section 2:- a chamber for heating apparatus to be under the floor at the Southeast of the Church (this is interesting as it was one of the pipes for the heating apparatus that corroded during the 2021 that led to the floor having to be replaced following a very expensive leak).

Section 3:- to remove the present Chancel and East wall of the nave and use the materials in the new building. To insert a stained-glass window and tablet recording it on the North wall of the Chancel. (the point about reusing materials is interesting as it fits in with our present ideas on recycling)

Section 4:- to renew to the floor of the nave in cement and wood blocks. New heating for the nave and Chancel. Also to reseat the nave with open benches of wood placed three feet apart.

From the Vestry minutes of 21 January 1893 it was reported that tenders for the work on the chancel had been received by the Church Improvement Committee from local and other builders; Beaumont - £1715; Brown, Braintree £1705; Chambers, Colchester £1194; Dobson, Colchester £1789; Dupont, Colchester £2079; Everett 1755; Grimes,

Colchester; £1685; Halliday, Stamford £1682.6.9(34d) Misskin, St. Albans £1987; Orfeur, Colchester £1770; Saunders, Dedham £1590.

Saunders were the lowest tender, but nothing could happen until sufficient funds were raised, however the Committee were keen to do as much work as possible with what funds were available to avoid the expense of having to go out to tender again.

As yet, I have not been able to uncover later vestry minutes to see how the work proceeded. Yet in the Essex County Standard of May 19th 1894, there is a report about the restoration of St Leonards. It states (in the language of the 19th Century) that

“a goodly number of parishioners assembled at the church on Thursday afternoon to witness the laying of the top stone of the building which is a handsome finial cross surmounting the eastern gable. A Hymn, “O God our Help in Ages Past” was sung as the stone was placed in its position by the Clerk of Works, Mr George Spearman. The Rector said the following words “this top stone is placed upon this building and this house of prayer is crowned with the sign of redemption in token that we erect this Chancel to the glory of God and in the faith of Christ crucified.”

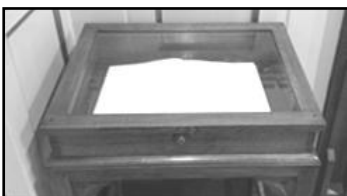
There followed a brief service of bible readings and prayers that all who came to worship there may remember the sacrifice of the death of Christ and the benefits received therefrom, and all who passed in pursuit of business or pleasure, may be reminded of the eternal life which our saviour laid down his life on the cross to win back mankind”.

The report went on to state that work was approaching completion and that it was hoped that consecration would take place in July.
